SUBJECT: Procedures for Emergency Release from Grand Mesa Youth Services Center

#### **INTRODUCTION:**

The DYS Western Region Detention Catchment Area includes 18 counties located in six (6) Judicial Districts, including the 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup>, 21<sup>st</sup>, and 22<sup>nd</sup> Judicial Districts. The counties are: Moffat, Routt, Grand, Rio Blanco, Garfield, Pitkin, Mesa, Delta, Montrose, Gunnison, Hinsdale, Ouray, San Miguel, La Plata, Archuleta, San Juan, Montezuma, and Dolores.

The Western Region Catchment Area has capacity for a maximum of nineteen (19) detention beds. The beds are located at Grand Mesa Youth Services Center (GMYSC). The DYS Western Region only has secure detention capacity and it is provided by the following facility: The Grand Mesa Youth Services Center located at 360 28 Road in Grand Junction.

The original SB91-94 legislation called for the development of emergency release criteria to manage detention populations. As a result, a report detailing guidelines for emergency release was prepared by a joint committee of the Department of Human Services and the State Judicial Department in 1991. CRS 19-2-924 continues to provide for the development of emergency release criteria and procedures. With that report serving as the guideline the following implementing procedures shall be implemented if the detention populations at GMYSC would be exceeded by the admission of one or more youth.

## **DEFINITIONS:**

**Emergency** release:

The process of reviewing the profile of juveniles being held in

secure detention when the numbers of youth being detained

reaches a level of "crisis overcrowding."

Crisis overcrowding:

100% of bed capacity. The detention bed capacity at Grand Mesa

Youth Services Center is 19. In order to anticipate possible

overcrowding situations, when the population reaches 17 youth for

the region, referral for emergency release planning shall be instituted.

#### **Priority for Release:**

The order of priority for considering juveniles for emergency release as outlined in the "Report to the General Assembly concerning the Emergency Release of Juvenile Offenders from State Institutional and Regional Detention Facilities Funded by the State."

- 1. Municipal, Traffic, Game & Fish
- 2. Pretrial Misdemeanor
- 3. Sentenced Youth, either statutory or contempt
- 4. Probation Violation Holds
- 5. Failure to appear holds
- Pretrial felony holds
- 7. Pretrial committed holds

# Release Consideration Factors:

The "Report to the General Assembly Concerning the Emergency Release of Juvenile Offenders from State Institutional and Regional Detention Facilities Funded by the State" identified the following factors, which should be considered when making a recommendation for early emergency release:

- 1. The type and seriousness of the offense
- 2. Prior adjudications and what type of offenses
- 3. Stability of the family or custodian to whom the juvenile will be released
- 4. Identification of any special needs, e.g., drug/alcohol, sex offender, mental health

#### Release Plan:

As recommended by the "Report to the General Assembly Concerning the Emergency Release of Juvenile Offenders from State Institutional and Regional Detention Facilities Funded by the State," the Release Plan prepared by the local Judicial District's detention case manager and submitted to the court for consideration of emergency release shall include, at a minimum, the following items as:

- 1. For pretrial juveniles, a bonding recommendation with appropriate conditions (Refer to CRS 19-2-302 [4]).
- 2. For sentenced juvenile offenders, a detailed supervision plan.
- 3. Notification to parents of the juvenile being released.

## Catchment Areas:

CRS 19-2-402.5 provides for the identification of catchment areas for detention facilities operated by or under contract with the

Department of Human Services. GMYSC has been identified to provide detention services for the 6<sup>th</sup> Judicial District.
